The DoD's intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance (ISR) capabilities -- such as satellites and unmanned aircraft systems -- are crucial to military operations, and demand for ISR capabilities has increased. Congress directed DoD to fully integrate its ISR capabilities, also known as the ISR enterprise, as it works to meet current and future ISR needs. This Digital Modernization Strategy is the cornerstone for advancing our digital environment to afford the Joint Force a competitive advantage in the modern battlespace. Our approach is simple. A few U.S.-flagged vessels have been affected -- most recently the SV Quest, a private yacht on which four Amer. were killed in Feb. 2011. The growing frequency and severity of attacks renew the urgency to address the piracy threat. As Somalia is unable to repress piracy, the NSC developed the Countering Piracy off the Horn of Africa: Action Plan in Dec. 2008 to prevent, disrupt, and prosecute piracy in collaboration with international and industry partners. Performance Management: DOD Is Terminating the National Security Personnel System, but Needs a Strategic Plan to Guide Its Design of a New System

This edition of the U. S. Army War College Guide to National Security Policy and Strategy continues to reflect the structure and approach of the core national security strategy and policy curriculum at the War College. The fourth edition is published in two volumes that correspond roughly to the Department of National Security and Strategy's core courses: "Theory of War and Strategy" and "National Security Policy and Strategy." Like previous editions, this one is largely an expansion of its predecessor rather than a major rewriting. About a quarter of the chapters are new, and several others have undergone significant rewrites or updates. However, approximately half of the book remains unchanged. Although this is not primarily a textbook, it does reflect both the method and manner we use to teach strategy formulation to America's future senior leaders. The book is not a comprehensive or exhaustive treatment of either strategic theory or the policymaking process. Both volumes are organized to proceed from the general to the specific. Thus the first volume opens with general thoughts on the nature and theory of war and strategy, proceeds to look at the complex aspect of power, and concludes with specific theoretical issues. Similarly, the second volume begins by examining the policy/strategy process, moves to a look at the strategic environment, and concludes with some specific issues. This edition adds several short case

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studies that can be used to illustrate the primary material in the volume.

Special Access Programs represent some of the Department's most sensitive information and must be protected accordingly. We can no longer rely on physical isolation as a primary risk mitigation strategy. Threats and risks often outpace our ability to implant robust, multi-disciplinary countermeasures. Cost and timelines to develop threats to our data almost always pale to the cost and time to implement countermeasures. Given the rapid increase in cybersecurity threats and prioritization from the SECDEF, the senior cybersecurity professionals responsible for authorizing information systems to process SAP have identified three security controls which offer mitigations so significant they can no longer be tailored. Beginning in this revision of the JSIG, we are introducing controls that are not

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tailorable. Historically, the ability to tailor controls has been delegated to the field but senior leadership is no longer willing to accept the risk of high volume data loss. Recognizing there may be extreme situations in which it is not feasible to implement these controls in their entirety, the authority to tailor or modify these controls is delegated to the component SAP senior authorizing official. This waiver authority cannot be further delegated. The establishment of a senior authorizing official for each DoD component will elevate the status of cybersecurity functions so they more effectively influence department-wide strategy, policy, and investments. The Risk Management Framework (RMF) is a framework designed to be tailored to meet organizational needs while providing adequate risk management of data and information systems. Transformation to the RMF is a daunting task and we appreciate all the effort to date within the Department and Industry. We applaud all the hard work of the Joint SAP Cybersecurity Working Group (JSCS WG) and the spectacular leadership of the individuals who created this joint "coalition of the willing."

Maritime security threats to the U.S. are broad, including the naval forces of potential adversary nations, terrorism, and piracy. The attacks on the USS Cole in 2000, in Mumbai in 2008, and on the Maersk Alabama in 2009 highlight these threats.
