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## Eliminating Racial Disparities in Maternal and Infant

Maternal death or maternal mortality is defined by the World Health Organization (WHO) as "the death of a woman while pregnant or within 42 days of termination of pregnancy, irrespective of the duration and site of the pregnancy, from any cause related to or aggravated by the pregnancy or its management but not from accidental or incidental causes."

## Maternal Mortality - Our World in Data

The first question can be answered by comparing maternal mortality rates in the United States, England and Wales, and Sweden (). In all 3 settings, maternal mortality rates tended to remain on a high plateau and at very much the same level until the end of the 19th century.

## Maternal Health in the United States - Maternal Health

Table 3 shows the other direct causes of maternal mortality. Complications of delivery were responsible for 2.8% (1.6-4.9) and obstructed labour for 2.8% (1.4-5.5) of all maternal deaths worldwide, both reported within the other direct category, which accounted for 9.6% of all maternal deaths worldwide.

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Highest Maternal Mortality Rates . Some of the highest mortality rates in the world are all countries on the African continent. In fact, approximately 62% of all maternal deaths worldwide occur there. Sierra Leone . The country that leads the list is Sierra Leone, an African nation, with a maternal mortality rate of 1,360 deaths per 100,000 births.

Maternal mortality declined by 38 per cent between 2000 and 2017 Maternal mortality refers to deaths due to complications from pregnancy or childbirth. From 2000 to 2017, the global maternal mortality ratio declined by 38 per cent - from 342 deaths to 211 deaths per 100,000 live births, according to UN inter-agency estimates. This translates into an average annual rate of reduction of 2.9

### **Maternal Mortality From All Conditions**

In the first official data on U.S. maternal mortality since 2007, black women are shown to have a disproportionate fatality rate during pregnancy or within 42 days after giving birth. While the national rate is 17.4 deaths per 100,000 births in 2018, 37.1 black women died per 100,000 births. This is 2.5 times the rate of white women (14.7) and 3.1 times that of Hispanic women (11.8).

If all regions had the health of today's best-off countries: Today the world region with the lowest maternal mortality is the European Union, where 8 women die per 100,000 live births. In today's world where 140 million women give birth each year, if all countries had this level of maternal mortality, 11,000 would die. 3

Not all states gather information on race, ethnicity, income and health insurance status because there are no national standards for data collection and reporting of maternal mortality statistics. Such data are critical for recognizing and understanding disparities, and without them there has been insufficient accountability for maternal mortality.

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Emergency obstetric care. Emergency obstetric care is critical to reducing maternal mortality. All five of the major direct causes of maternal death – haemorrhage, sepsis, unsafe abortion, hypertensive disorders and obstructed labour – can be treated at a well-staffed, well-equipped health facility. In such settings, many newborns with asphyxia or infection can also be saved.

### **Countries With The Highest Maternal Mortality Rates**

Between 2000 and 2017, the maternal mortality ratio (MMR, number of maternal deaths per 100,000 live births) dropped by about 38% worldwide. 94% of all maternal deaths occur in low and lower middle-income countries. Young adolescents (ages 10-14) face a higher risk of complications and death as a result of pregnancy than other women.

### **Maternal mortality - World Health Organization**

A study published in 2008 in the American Journal of Obstetrics and Gynecology found that maternal mortality is 2.2 per 100,000 for c-sections and 0.2 per 100,000 for vaginal births. The reason a cesarean section has a higher rate is that it's a surgery, and surgery has some risks.

All of the information obtained is summarized, and medically-trained epidemiologists determine the cause of death and whether the death was pregnancy-related.
